This Architect Found His Foundation in the Theater

Why did you join Sigma Alpha Epsilon?

A number of my architecture friends—I was in the architecture school at Pennwere in the house. I did not pledge in my freshman year. I waited until fall of my sophomore year.

Tell us about a favorite memory of the fraternity.

I guess the best would be when four of us had an apartment at the top of an old house right across the street from the fraternity house. We called it "The Room at the Top," after a movie of the time called The Room at the Top. It was a neat apartment, and being architects, we designed a bar and all kinds of things in it. We used it a lot for entertaining the guys from the house. After we graduated, other SAEs took it over, and it went on for a number of years, still known as the Room at the Top. But eventually the university bought all those old houses, tore them down and built a high-rise dormitory. While we lived there, my mother bought us a white bartender's jacket, embroidered with "The Room at the Top." And another set of parents had matchbooks made. We really sort of had a lounge going on.

What kind of influence has the fraternity had on your life since graduation?

I can't say there were major life lessons learned, but I so enjoyed the friendships,



the people, even those I didn't know as well. I liked the values they all represented. While we had a good time, people were concerned with academics, they were involved in student activities, and they were involved in the campus. And I guess a lot of that has carried into my own life, being involved in things in the city. It was all an extremely positive experience.

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What other activities did you enjoy in college?

I was in the Mask and Wig Club, an all-male theatrical, musical and comedy club which turned 115 years old this year. That's an organization where the people in it are almost as close as those in a fraternity. So having John Vosmek and Charlie Dagit in both the fraternity and Mask and Wig... well, we stay in close touch. I was also active in the Christian association. I served on the board of that group.

What do you do for a living?

I graduated with an architecture degree and worked for two different architects for two years. At that time, I became producer of the Mask and Wig show. Then, the university created a new job as the Business 66 I retired early; Manager of the Performing Arts, which would handle the business end of Mask and Wig and Glee Club and the band. But the main responsibility was the Mask and Wig annual tour. Having become the producer of the show, I was very concerned about the tour. At a Mask and Wig Board meeting, the Dean of Men at

Penn mentioned the new job. So after the meeting, at the bar of the Mask and Wig club, I mentioned that the job sounded very interesting to me. It sounded like something fun to do for a couple of years. The Dean said if I wanted the job it was mine. How's that for a job interview? So I took it, thinking I would go back and be an architect in a couple of years. Well, not long after I took the job, I became in charge of all undergraduate student activities, about 80 of them. Then in 1970 - 71, the university built a new performing arts center, the Annenberg Center. I moved over there, still in charge of student activities but also as assistant managing director of the Annenberg Center; they book theatre and dance and all kinds of performing arts. Then in 1975 I became the managing director for 22 years. I retired five years ago. I retired early; I had the opportunity and I always wanted to retire early, so I took it.

Tell us about your family. Have you married? Do you have children?

Around 1966, Penn merged the Dean of Men's and Dean of Women's staffs to the Dean of Students. The Assistant Dean of Students was a Marguerite Petrullo. We got to know each other very well and in 1968, we got married. We have a daughter, Allison, and a son, Stephen Christopher. They are both grown and married. Both went to Penn; that's one of the great benefits of working for Penn. Our daughter just had our first grandchild, Meg, which is very exciting. Our son, Steve, was an English major at Penn. After graduation, he went to San Francisco to work in publishing. But after a couple of years, he decided that wasn't for him and

> announced that he was going to go back to school to become a winemaker. He and his wife. Laura live in Portland, OR and he works for a small boutique winery called Beaux Freres. They make exclusively Pinot Noir. It is very highly rated and sells for

about \$120 per bottle. Even at half price, I told him to forget it!

What hobbies do you enjoy?

Twenty-five year ago, we bought an old house in Bryn Mawr, which was built in 1887. It was part of an estate; all on a little compound right on the edge of Bryn Mawr. We had the opportunity and bought the house that was built for the daughter. It was in basic good shape, but considering it's age, it did need work. But it had wonderful details, with beautiful woodwork and ceilings, and it had 4 acres of grounds. We knew it had a lot of work to be done, and I asked Marguerite if she could live in it for 10 years while the work was done. It's now been almost 25 years and we've done most of the work, but we are just about to redo the kitchen. She's been very patient. I really enjoy doing the work; that's the architect in me coming out.



Being the director of the Annenberg Center, we became involved in the cultural life of the city. We got involved with the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts, the art museum, but we never seemed to have time to go to the shows. So now, we do! My wife has become very involved in the Women's Committee of the University Museum. So I go to a lot of those events and help her out. I am the Treasurer of a statewide group called Pennsylvania Presenters, which is for arts centers like the Annenberg, all across the state. We try to coordinate getting groups or tours to come through many of the centers, which usually gets everyone a better deal.

Agee Endowment Will Bolster Chapter for Years to Come

Another year has passed and another group of True Gentlemen have taken hold of the reins guiding Penn Theta.

I always enjoy my visits to the chapter house, but especially those not associated with a special function. Then, I can really feel the social fabric woven by the current inhabitants of 3908 Spruce St. I am pleased to say SAE continues to be a strong part of Penn's Greek community.

To evidence the strength that comes from the alumni base, I recently received a phone call from the SAE Foundation in Evanston, IL. Now, phone calls from Evanston usually take two distinct forms: either I am being hit up for money or the undergrads have screwed up. This time, however, the call fell into neither category! The foundation had received a \$25,000 check from the estate of Brother James L. Agee III '51 to be used specifically for educational purposes. Did you know ...

- Since 1900, two-thirds of U.S. Presidential Cabinet members have been Greek.
- Since 1910, 85 percent of justices named to the U.S. Supreme Court have been Greek.
- 65 percent of U.S. physicians and 78 percent of U.S. lawyers are Greek.
- Each year, Greeks do more than 850,000 hours of community service.
