#### The Past is So Important

We received the following note through our efforts to preserve the best stories from our chapter's history.

"I had reported to SAE National that my husband, **Lee M. Craig '47**, passed away on August 16, 2009, but I guess the chapter was not informed. I truly wish he were here and was able to answer your questions. We were married for 61 years and I know how close he felt to many of the brothers. I recall being at the SAE house parties as an undergraduate. Great memories -- so long ago. Lee left Penn for the Air Corps during WWII and returned in the latter part of 1945 after his discharge.

This story is not about the fraternity, but he used to laugh about one of his fellow band members who said to him (after marching on Franklin Field) in astonishment regarding Lee's sousaphone, 'Gosh, you're really playing it!; Lee then found out that the rest of the 'line' was merely carrying the big instruments to make it look good! The war affected student life in so many ways. Strangely, I was looking at Lee's 1943 Record yearbook this week and at the SAE picture in it. I felt saddened thinking how many of the men did not return from service, and how many are no longer with us.


