STEVE SALTZMAN '85 STEPS DOWN

SAE Chapter Advisor and Corporation House President Hopes For "New Blood"

While cleaning my attic recently, I found a Penn Theta newsletter from Spring 1986. I had contributed an article as the house corporation president—34 years ago! I have been connected to Penn Theta since I was initiated in the spring of 1982. There are nearly 1,000 alumni of Penn Theta who may not know me personally, but when they stop by the Chapter House during either Homecoming or Alumni Day, they recognize my name from newsletters and periodic appeals for donations.

I attended a recent chapter meeting to give my semi-annual address to the undergrads - the gist of my speech was, as always, "Don't do anything stupid." But, before the full chapter meeting, I met with the executive committee and announced I would be stepping down as Penn Theta's Chapter Advisor at the end of this school year. During the recent Penn Hoops Weekend, when SAE alumni descend on Philadelphia to watch Penn Basketball at the Palestra (and quaff a few adult beverages both before and after the games) I had several conversations with SAE alums. I have known these guys since they were pledges (and had hair.) One alum pointed out that at my present age, Russ Heuer, SAE's guardian angel for 30+ years and my predecessor, had been dead for almost a year. That fact really floored me.

When Russ dumped this job into my lap in 1986, I thought it would be temporary, until someone older and more responsible took over for me. I fear that I am fast approaching an age where I am no longer relevant to the current undergrads. Members of the current executive committee assured me that my participation was both valuable and appreciated, but I am older than most of their fathers. A fraternity's chapter advisor should be like an older brother or a young uncle, and definitely someone more facile with current social media communications.

The time has arrived for some new blood to take over as both chapter advisor and house corporation president. I don't think the expectation for the next chapter advisor should be to serve for 30+ years!

I wonder who will step up to the plate, but I hope I have set an example that others may follow. I have always seen my primary role as preserving the existence of Penn Theta, so that when an alum returns to campus, he has a place to go that he once called home. When I return to Penn for my 50th reunion (in only 15 years), I plan to quickly bail on the Old Guard tent on College Green and decamp to the Chapter House, drink a cheap beer (or two) and bore the undergrads with my stories.

I thank you for the honor and privilege of serving Penn Theta for all these years. Phi Alpha!
